Dear Friends,

On 3/13/15 the Governor announced the members of the newly created Local Government and Unfunded Mandates Task Force. The task force is comprised of statewide municipal and county leaders, representatives of school districts, state legislators, and experts in consolidation, which includes members from DuPage County. The task force is chaired by Lt. Governor Evelyn Sanguinetti with a goal to streamline services that will help to prevent waste and use taxpayer dollars more efficiently. It will also find ways to reduce the number of unfunded mandates the state imposes on local communities and districts. Their work will hopefully overlap and continue the recommendations from the previous governor’s Classrooms First Commission chaired by then Lt. Governor Sheila Simon, which published its findings in July 2012. I was fortunate to have participated as a member on the Realignment Work Group which addressed a variety of ways for school districts to share services/resources. We continue to advocate for the implementation of those recommendations that we developed after many months of work, which can be viewed on our website at www.winfield34.org/boardofeducation.



D34 and our partner districts: Benjamin D25, West Chicago D33, and Community High School D94 continue to demonstrate our commitment to collaborate on a variety of initiatives as we have over many years in our efforts to utilize our districts’ collective resources more efficiently. As noted in the final consolidation study conducted by the state in 2009 (Executive Summary found on our website at www.winfield34.org/boardofeducation) our four partner districts were lauded for our students’ achievement, maintaining fund balances and well maintained buildings. We were also acknowledged for our ongoing cooperation to meet regularly; not only the district superintendents but also our joint school boards and Board of Education Presidents. These collaborative efforts have resulted in partnering on curriculum adoptions, joint bids on supplies purchasing, shared professional development for staff, shared programming to accommodate the specific needs of students with disabilities as well as students identified as gifted requiring an alternate educational environment and even joint fundraising planned cooperatively by our Education Foundations.

STRATEGIC PLAN

The Strategic Planning process that we implemented this past school year is another example of our ongoing cooperative efforts with our community that was facilitated through the Consortium for Educational Change (CEC), an Illinois organization of over 90 member school districts that produced measurable goals such that D34

can now “live” our Strategic Plan beginning this August. Our Plan came from our own ideas and aspirations, coupled with effective research-based practices used by the best schools and school districts. The Planning Team represented all levels of staff, the Board of Education, parents and community members such as; Cadence, Winfield Park District, the business community, etc. It also represented a wide range of D34 staff. All told over 30 people participated on our Planning Team over seven months during the FY15 school year that ultimately created our new Plan, of which we are very proud. This August we begin work on creating our Plan’s dashboard which will become a “live view” on our website of our progress toward and completion of our six identified goal areas. A great big THANK YOU to the collaborative relationships we have established with our community that continues to contribute to our District’s success. Full-day Kindergarten

This was the first year for full-day kindergarten in District 34 and it proved to be as successful as was expected. Data collected throughout the year using AIMSweb and Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) illustrate the academic growth that took place this year. One of the measures in AIMSweb that indicates reading readiness is Phoneme Segmentation Fluency and this year, 77% of the students were at or above district level expectations, compared to 42% at the end of the 13-14 school year with the half-day program. Phoneme segmentation fluency is the ability to break down a word into individual sounds. When students have strong phoneme segmentation fluency, they are able to manipulate sounds and letters in order to read and write words. This was also the first year that kindergarten students participated in the MAP assessments and 87% of the kindergarten students met their individual student growth targets in Math. Kindergarten math skills that were targeted in the MAP assessment include basic addition facts, two-dimensional and three-dimensional shapes, graphing, place value and counting. These are just a few examples of the excellent academic growth that occurred, although it is not the only advantage to having a full-day kindergarten program. The social-emotional growth that our children exhibited was seen in their peer-to-peer interactions, self-regulation ability, and day-to-day problem solving skills. We look forward to many more years of the positive impact of full day kindergarten.



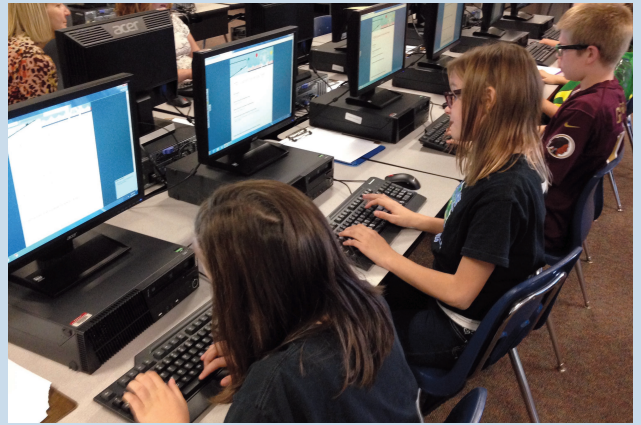
D34 8th Grade Government Studies

STEM Learning in D34

Innovator Benjamin Franklin said, "Tell me and I forget, teach me and I may remember, involve me and I learn." This is what Winfield Middle School students experienced in our first year of participating in a STEM!

Students completed a variety of engaging units that required them to design products, get their hands dirty and even struggle a little bit in trying to figure out solutions to challenges. We had many highlights in this first year of implementation! The K'NEX Education Amusement Park unit provided an opportunity to combine real-world applications with STEM concepts. Students were engaged and energized as they gained further knowledge in understanding engineering concepts associated with rides and structures. The Lego Mindstorms Education EV3 unit provided students with an opportunity in constructing and programming robots. Robots could be seen roaming around the classroom in variety of motions, talking, singing, racing and even competing against each other challenges. Participation



in Computer Science Week and the Hour of Code allowed students the opportunity to learn computer science and computer programming through engaging courses. The final unit of the year students gained knowledge and a hands-on experience with the 3D printers. They learned how 3D printers solve problems in today's society and how to design prototypes. Most importantly, the 3D experience gave them first hand experience with the design process, learning to embrace failure as many failing prototypes lead to improvement and change.

Throughout this first year of STEM, the true focus has been on improving critical thinking and problem solving skills, while increasing their overall enthusiasm and interest in future STEM careers. It was clearly evident that Winfield students will be future producers, artists, designers and innovators!
